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

THE Museum of Printing hosted the annual meeting of the New England Chapter of the American Printing History Association.

Outgoing president Alice Beckwith (pictured above) chaired the election of the group's officers for 2008—incoming president Robert Soorian, vice president Philip Weimerskirck, treasurer Alice Beckwith, and secretary David Hall were elected.

The group celebrated the birthday of J. Ben Lieberman, founder of APHA, with birthday cake and the ceremonial "Let freedom ring" bell ringing.

The same was true for students from Bridgewater State College (below). Bridgewater State College is a public liberal arts college located in Bridgewater, Massachusetts. It is the largest of the state's nine state colleges outside of the University of Massachusetts system.

The Museum of Printing has fulfilled a unique role in the introduction of printing to high school and college students. It is a proactive program to help students understand the role of print throughout history.







The Typographers Association of New York ended after over 75 years of existence, but 50 stalwarts have held an annual reunion for the last five years.
